

TOWN COUNCIL MINUTES**FEBRUARY 19, 2008**

Due to the President's Day holiday, the regularly scheduled meeting of the Hampden Town Council was held on Tuesday, February 19, 2008. The meeting was held at the municipal building council chambers and was called to order by Mayor Briggs at 7:00 p.m.

A. CONSENT AGENDA

There were no Treasurer's Warrants for signatures of the Finance Committee. Councilor Arnett requested that Items A.4.b. and A.4.d. be set aside. Motion by Councilor Arnett, seconded by Councilor Brann to accept the balance of the Consent Agenda – unanimous vote in favor.

A.4.b. POOL BOARD MINUTES – 1/8/2008

Councilor Arnett noted that the minutes were not labeled as Pool Board minutes and suggested that it would be good policy that all reports be labeled as to their source.

Motion by Councilor Arnett, seconded by Councilor Cushing to accept Item A.4.b. – unanimous vote in favor.

A.4.d. RECREATION COMMITTEE MINUTES – 12/19/2007

Councilor Arnett noted that the Recreation Committee is in the process of updating its by-laws and one of the items the committee is working on is "Duties of the Recreation Director". He felt that it was inappropriate for the Recreation Committee to be defining responsibilities of a paid member of the professional staff; that that is the responsibility of the Town Manager and to incorporate that as an article in the by-laws is bad policy.

There was some discussion about conducting an overview of all committees and their structures and possibly developing a uniform system to educate committee members as to what their roles and responsibilities are.

Motion by Councilor Arnett, seconded by Councilor Cox to accept Item A.4.d. – unanimous vote in favor.

B. PUBLIC COMMENTS

Bill Shakespeare of 1060 Western Avenue addressed the Council regarding several issues. A copy of his comments is attached.

C. POLICY AGENDA

1. PUBLIC HEARINGS

There were none.

2. NOMINATIONS-APPOINTMENTS-ELECTIONS

There were none.

3. UNFINISHED BUSINESS

a. WATER DISTRICT UPDATE

Manager Lessard updated the Council with respect to the ongoing rate increase discussions held by the PUC. There was a second technical conference on February 14th and more information was requested at that meeting. The Public Advocate wrapped up their comments on the information and proposed a settlement to Water District representatives which would have reduced the amount requested for the rate increase. It was taken only as information and the law firm representing the Water District will consider it, but there are other issues relative to the cost of the rate increase proceedings contributing to additional costs and a question about whether the contingency requested initially as part of the rate increase was going to be sufficient. There will be a telephone conference call at the beginning of next week.

After the last Council meeting, Manager Lessard asked Attorney Russell to seek experienced legal counsel to determine what it would take to annex the Water District. Attorney Russell noted that he had suggested retaining counsel that the City of Brewer used in this process, but the Water District has already retained that individual. Attorney Russell has come up with another list of experienced attorneys and suggested a meeting in executive session to discuss which of those alternatives the Council wants to pursue.

Mayor Briggs noted that there was a recent article in the local newspaper regarding water line breaks in Hampden and he asked Water District Superintendent Cam Torrey where the breaks had

occurred and what they involved. Mr. Torrey explained that there had been three major breaks in the last week and a half and they lost approximately 1.5 to 2 million gallons of water. There was one 8" main break on Main Road North near Westbrook Terrace, a 6" main break near R & K Variety on Main Road North and the other was on Cottage Street.

b. BID RESULTS – 151 POND ROAD MOBILE HOME

Manager Lessard informed the Council that two bids were received; one for \$2900 and one for \$3500. The total outstanding taxes, interest and costs is approximately \$7500, but the principal alone is closer to the high bid amount. The property has been on the Town's uncollected tax list for many years and she recommended going forward with the sale to the high bidder, clear the uncollected tax amount and abate the costs and interest.

Motion by Councilor Brann, seconded by Councilor Colford to accept the bid from Lorenzo Daigle in the amount of \$3500 and to abate the costs and interest - unanimous vote in favor.

c. COMMUNICATIONS COMMITTEE – ESTABLISH AS TOWN COUNCIL COMMITTEE – COUNCILOR ARNETT

Motion by Councilor Arnett, seconded by Councilor Cushing to establish a Hampden Town Council Communications Committee as follows: Be it resolved that the Town Council shall add to its standing committees as identified under rule 11 of the Hampden Town Council rules item "h" Communications Committee; Be it further resolved that it shall be the purpose of the Communications Committee to advise and assist the Town Manager, or town staff person whom he/she may designate on all matters of communication including but not limited to the town newsletter, the town website, the town cable channels, and town sponsored communication activities.

During discussion, it was pointed out that all communications encompasses many different areas and that the language needed to be clarified.

Councilor Arnett amended the motion as follows: to establish a Hampden Town Council Communications Committee as follows: Be it resolved that the Town Council shall add to its standing committees as identified under rule 11 of the Hampden Town Council rules item "h" Communications Committee; Be it further resolved that it shall be the purpose of the Communications Committee to advise and assist the Town Manager, or town staff person whom he/she may designate on matters of communication related to citizen services including but not limited to the town newsletter, the town website, the town cable channels, and town

sponsored communication activities. Councilor Cushing agreed to the amendment.

Attorney Russell advised that in changing this from a citizens' committee to an official Council committee, that the only voting members of the committee are the Council members.

Vote on the motion as amended was unanimously in favor.

4. NEW BUSINESS

a. ZONING ORDINANCE TEXT AMENDMENT RE: BUILDING PERMITS – REFERRAL TO PLANNING BOARD

Motion by Councilor Brann, seconded by Councilor Cox to refer this to the Planning Board as written and submitted by the Code Enforcement Officer – unanimous vote in favor.

D. COMMITTEE REPORTS

Councilor Colford scheduled a meeting of the Appointments Committee for Tuesday, February 26th at 7:00 pm.

Councilor Arnett reported that the Communications Committee is in the process of identifying the anticipated workload for the coming year and looking at budget issues for next year. Councilor Arnett requested that all Council committee meetings be shown on the community calendar on the Town's website and asked that the Committee chairs or staff notify the Clerk of meeting dates and times.

Councilor Arnett further reported that the Charter & Ordinance Committee met earlier in the evening and discussed the different committee structures. The Committee feels it would be helpful for the Council to clarify what is expected of all boards and committees (range of responsibility, requirement for and approval of minutes, etc.)

Councilor Brann reported that the Comprehensive Planning Committee is making progress. He also reminded the Finance Committee that there is a meeting scheduled for 7:00 pm on February 28th.

Councilor Cushing reported that the Council's Economic Development Committee met with the Town's Economic Development advisory committee on February 11th. The next meeting of that committee will be on February 25th at 7:00 pm.

Councilor Arnett and Councilor Cushing reported that in the process of discussing the Communications Committee budget, it has become clear that there is a need for input from people with technological experience and that the Council should consider establishing a Technology Committee consisting of staff and citizens. This will be agendaed for the next meeting.

Councilor Cox reported that the Community Services Committee has met several times since the last Council meeting. They have discussed tree board establishment, heard from Jim Feverston that the Tree City application is in progress and he hopes to hear something by the middle of March, discussed the existing high school site and feedback on community input about possible uses, and discussed trail work at Dorothea Dix Park this summer and the possible formation of Friends of Dorothea Dix Park organization. The committee has developed a calendar of events through the end of summer and would like to work with the Communications Committee to highlight some of those events. The Committee also had a discussion about the review of meeting minutes and what they need to do with them. The next meeting will be on March 4th at 6:30 pm.

E. MANAGER'S REPORT

A copy of the Manager's Report is attached hereto.

SCHOOL BUDGET REPRESENTATIVE: Councilor Murphy will serve as the Town's representative in the school budget process and Councilor Brann will serve as the alternate.

F. COUNCILOR'S COMMENTS

Councilor Cushing reported that the Communications Committee is moving forward with the transition to additional hosts of the Hampden Highlights news shows. Dan Stewart will be on-screen beginning in March with a number of interviews and several other people have been recruited to help with the Hampden Happenings shows. He expressed appreciation to those volunteers. Councilor Cushing has also had discussions with Mr. Moore at Hampden Academy about possibly airing programs produced by some of his students.

Councilor Brann suggested that the outdoor graduation might be a good topic for one of the television shows produced by the students. Councilor Brann also reported that there is a culvert on Mayo that has sunk and needs to be filled in with gravel. He further commented that as we move on with the high school planning, the Council should have a meeting with the School Board to ensure that everyone is kept up to date during the process.

Councilor Arnett commented that he would like to hear periodic reports at Council meetings from the School Building Committee representatives. He also requested that the next agenda include an item relative to the Capital Budget process.

Councilor Colford encouraged everyone to take advantage of the Lura Hoyt Pool this winter. He also commented that the Council should look into procuring the existing high school building for use as a recreation center for the community.


EXECUTIVE SESSION:

Motion by Councilor Colford, seconded by Councilor Brann to re-enter regular session at 10:03 pm – unanimous vote in favor.


G. ADJOURNMENT

Dear MRC Member Community:

The MRC Board of Directors is pleased to provide the enclosed check for the quarterly cash distribution return to Amending Charter Municipalities and new Charter Municipalities for the First Quarter of 2008. The payment is based on tipping fees, plant performance and asset activity in the Fourth Quarter of 2007.

Consistent with MRC Board-approved policies and Transaction Guidelines, a total distribution amount of \$906,197.42 to the Amending Charter Municipalities was approved to meet the system-wide target value of \$45.00 per ton, which is tipping fees less cash distributions. The tipping fee for the Fourth Quarter was \$65.25. Therefore, on average as a group, the Amending Charter Municipalities need a cash distribution of \$906,197.42 in order to achieve the \$45.00 per ton target. This total amount is the product of \$20.25 per ton and 44,750.49 tons of solid waste delivered by all Amending Charter Municipalities in the Fourth Quarter of 2007. New Charter Municipalities also received Performance Credits for Fourth Quarter equal to tons delivered multiplied by the difference between the tipping fee of \$65.75 and the new Charter Municipality target value of \$54.00 per ton.

This cash distribution to Amending Charter Municipalities was generated as a result of cash proceeds of \$695,336.61 from a February 1, 2008 Promissory Note payment and \$210,860.81 in Net Cash Flow received as a result of PERC ownership interests. Funds from Performance Credits in the amount of \$54,604.62 were distributed to new Charter Municipalities.

The MRC Board of Directors thanks all MRC members for their efforts and contributions in support of the MRC mission of an environmentally safe, long-term solid waste disposal solution at a reasonable and affordable cost.

The meeting was opened at 7 p.m.

Chairman Ed Murphy gave background on the transfer station operation and asked the Town Manager to explain the handouts provided that outlined costs for the transfer station in Hampden as well as information on how other communities deal with the subject of construction and demolition debris.

Problems with the Transfer Station operation center around concern that non-residents, commercial entities, and others are illegally disposing of wood, construction & demolition debris and appliances with refrigerants because the Town of Hampden does not charge for their disposal as is the practice in surrounding communities. As a means of controlling access and insuring that only those with legal stickers use the facility, there had been a proposal at a prior council meeting that the Transfer Station only accept such commodities two months of the year, in April and October. That idea was seen as too limiting by the full council and the Public Works Committee was directed to revisit the issue and bring back another suggestion.

The Town Manager told those in attendance that she had discussed the subject with Councilors Brann and Colford who were unable to make the meeting in order to get their input. Both had serious concerns about too severely limiting service availability for those wishing to dispose of items in addition to household trash. At the last council meeting an idea was briefly discussed that would limit such disposal to two weekends a month year round. Both Councilors agreed that they would support that concept with the provision that it is monitored and reviewed by the Council after a certain period of time to insure that it is working as desired.

All attendees voiced their opinions on this idea, including non-staff and non-council members. Concerns were raised about illegal dumping, inconveniencing the general public, the need for stricter enforcement, and what kind of access arrangements would be needed in order to make sure that all those entering the facility actually had current stickers.

Also discussed by the group was the need for the Town to institute a sticker and fee system for the disposal of white goods containing refrigerants. The fee would be paid at

the town office, a sticker would be obtained that would have to be affixed to the appliance when it went to the transfer station. A \$15 fee would cover the cost of removing the refrigerant that is currently paid by the Town.

After a good deal of discussion, a motion was made by Councilor Arnett, seconded by Councilor Murphy to recommend to the full council that the transfer station operation be changed to the following:

Household Trash/Recyclables/Swap Shop disposal Wednesday-Friday 10a.m.-6p.m. Saturday/Sunday 8 a.m. – 4 p.m. year round.

All other waste disposal including metal, appliances, wood, construction & demolition debris, shingles, computer monitors, and televisions shall be accepted the first and third weekend (both Saturday/Sunday) of each month from 8 a.m. – 4 p.m.

A \$15 fee shall be paid for the disposal of any appliance with a refrigerant that must be removed including air conditioners and refrigerators. The fee shall be paid at the Town Office and a sticker obtained that must be put on the appliance at the time of disposal.

In addition, the policy shall be implemented as of April 2, 2008 in order for appropriate notice to be sent to all Hampden transfer station users. On weekends that non-household trash is accepted there shall be staffing at the gate to check for stickers prior to entrance, and sufficient personnel on hand to appropriately handle recyclables, household trash, and the disposal of all other materials accepted.

The Committee also continues to recommend that the Town Office Staff follow the guidelines for issuing stickers that have been in place since the beginning of 2008. The vote on this motion was 2 – 0.

The Committee was also notified that a business in the Ammo Industrial Park had sought information related to connecting to Town water and sewer via the Hampden Business and Commerce Park. The Public Works director will meet with the Economic & Community Development Specialist and the Council Economic Development Committee to discuss this further. Mayor Briggs offered information relative to offers that were made to Ammo Industrial Park to participate in the project at the time the Business and Commerce Park was created. That information will be researched as part of the ongoing discussions.

The meeting was adjourned at 8:30 p.m.

Website

- It was the consensus of the group that business links to the website should be done through one link to the Hampden Business Association.
- The Hampden Business Association is in the process of updating its website
- Patrick Hayes may be interested in working with Public Works and Economic Development to get their pages of the Town Website up and running. He will contact the Manager to set up a time to meet to discuss how our website software works.
- Nancy suggested that the website would be improved with more personalization, such as adding the photos of staff and councilors as well as brief bios of the elected officials.
- A suggestion was made to sponsor a seasonal photo contest on the website.

Cable TV

- Shows for Hampden Highlights and Hampden Happenings have been prepared for the next 1.5 months.
- We have another intern interested in doing work with Brandon Gassett on our programming due to the fact that Kevin Matluck is no longer available. The Manager will contact Melissa Antononi for an interview time.
- There is a plan in place for diversifying the hosting of the two cable shows. Sgt. Dan Stewart of the Police Department has already done one show and Anne Gabianelli O'Reilly is also interested.
- Councilor Cushing met with Todd Moore from SAD #22 about involving Hampden Academy students in the cable TV programming.
- Councilor Cox suggested a show that would discuss student feedback on the proposed new school and what they would like to see as part of its design.

- Show suggestions were; recycling, Earth Day, Stream Clean-Up, Canoe Race, community forums, and other Community Services and Comprehensive Plan-related subjects.
- Councilor Arnett and the Manager will get more information about the Cable TV Association of Maine (CTAM) to determine if it is an organization in which we should consider membership. - It was the consensus of the Committee to ask the Council to authorize the Mayor to appoint an ad hoc Technology Committee to look at ways in which we can increase service and efficiency through the use of technology.


Energy Sources: Impacts and the Environment



Fuel Mix Change for Electricity Generation in New England


New England Electric Generation by Fuel Type





Report Objective and Early Results:

- Provide analysis to help wind task force, policy makers & public understand context for wind development – work in progress
- Analyze how much wind power is needed.
- How much wind power could be developed in Maine in a balanced and responsible fashion?

Renewable Energy Required to Meet Existing Environmental Commitments in Maine

- Grace study indicates that an additional 10,000 MWs of wind power is needed in New England by 2020 in order to meet existing environmental and economic policies
- If Maine and the region can not pursue energy efficiency aggressively, then the need may rise to over 15,000 MWs by 2020
- The region currently has 9,000 MWs of developable onshore wind potential of which between 55% and 80% exists in Maine

Environmental Considerations:

- What impact, if any, could the addition of wind power in Maine have upon air quality in the state and the state's efforts to combat climate change?
- Could there be a net reduction in emissions as a result of bringing more wind farms on line?

Would wind power in Maine help the state meet its commitments under various cap and trade programs (such as those for NOx, Sox, and CO2)?

Would it affect the cost of these programs to Maine citizens and/or businesses?

Wind Energy, Air Quality & Climate


- Wind generation has no direct emissions
- Wind displaces generation that does emit SO₂, NO_x, and CO₂, among other pollutants
- Wind can help the state meet its emission reduction commitments under multiple programs
- In doing so, wind generation makes it easier and less costly to meet its obligations
- And, it makes it easier overtime to lower the compliance caps further reducing emissions

ISO New England Update and Preview of Scenario Analysis Initiative ISO New England

- Published for Maine PUC on Aug. 2, 2007
- Explored the economic, reliability, and environmental impacts of various resource outcomes for meeting New England's future electricity needs – scenario analyses
- Acknowledged that the challenge for policymakers is to find an appropriate balance between economic and environmental goals while ensuring reliability of the electricity supply in the region.

ISO NE Electricity Scenario Analysis August 2007




Figure 5-10: Total annual CO₂ emissions, grouped by sensitivity case and showing the New England allocation of the 2018 RGGI cap allowances.




A summary of other Town officials and their salaries are as follows:

 Budget - \$12,000,000

 Public Safety Director's salary \$68,744
 Employees – 20 full time 20 part time
 Budget - \$1,800,000

Orono Public Works Director's salary \$70,000
 Employees – 16 full time

The cost of the manager with salary, mark-up on salary, and pick-up is at least \$120,000 per year. Consideration should be given to having one manager for the Orono and Hampden Water Districts in the future, a savings of \$60,000 per year for each district.

Both the District and the Town have hired attorneys. Before each party spends large sums of money, a committee should be formed to see if the District can function more economically.

In conclusion, the Board of Directors of the Hampden Water District should at the very least carefully consider the present salary and future recommended salary for its manager.
