TOWN COUNCIL MINUTES

October 5, 2009

The regularly scheduled meeting of the Hampden Town Council was held on Monday, October 5, 2009. The meeting was held at the municipal building council chambers and was called to order by Mayor Arnett at 7:00 p.m.

A. CONSENT AGENDA

Treasurer's Warrants were reviewed and signed by the Finance Committee at its meeting prior to the Council meeting. Councilor Shakespeare requested that Item A.3.b. be set aside. Motion by Councilor Cushing, seconded by Councilor Hughes to accept the balance of the Consent Agenda – unanimous vote in favor.

A.3.b. COMPLAINT – WATER DISTRICT – 9/23/09

Councilor Shakespeare noted that this is a letter from a resident to the Hampden Water District regarding a disconnection notice she received from the District because she did not have an approved testable backflow device on her seasonal pool. Councilor Shakespeare asked Manager Lessard if she could clarify the circumstances that led to the complaint. Manager Lessard explained she received a call from this resident who inquired whether the Town had any oversight over the Water District as she had received a letter indicating that her water would be turned off in 30 days if she did not comply with the provisions. She had dismantled the pool, it was no longer in her yard and disconnection did not seem reasonable. Manager Lessard explained that the purpose in sending the letter to the Town was to make the Town aware that this requirement is discretionary in terms of this type of backflow preventer and that some of our neighboring communities don't have it. She asked Water District Superintendent Cam Torrey if he could address what the resident's concerns are and what the District is doing about it.

Mr. Torrey reported that the Water District has answered the letter and the Board of Trustees will discuss this at their meeting next week. Mr. Torrey explained that the District is required to have a cross-connection control program. The State sets basic guidelines and the District has gone beyond those guidelines to insure additional safety. The District does require that any pool, or any vessel that holds over 300 gallons of water that is not directly plumbed, to have a testable backflow. Mr. Torrey explained the mechanics of a testable backflow device. He said if the pool has been

permanently removed, there will not be a problem, but if it goes back up in the spring, the backflow will be required.

Motion by Councilor Shakespeare, seconded by Councilor Cushing to accept Item A.3.b. – unanimous vote in favor.

2. NOMINATIONS-APPOINTMENTS-ELECTIONS

a. WARRANT FOR 11/3/2009 ELECTION

Motion by Councilor Cushing, seconded by Councilor Cox to approve and sign the Warrant for Municipal Election – unanimous vote in favor. The warrant was circulated for signatures of the Council.

b. NOTICE OF ELECTION re: EARLY PROCESSING OF ABSENTEE BALLOTS

Town Clerk Denise Hodsdon informed the Council that absentee ballots will be processed the day before the Election and this notice has been sent to the Secretary of State and all Municipal Party Chairs as required by statute.

3. UNFINISHED BUSINESS

a. SATURDAY BUS SERVICE – COUNCILOR BRANN

Councilor Brann reported that he has heard from a number of residents inquiring whether the Town was considering adding bus service on Saturdays. He asked Manager Lessard to investigate the cost of operating a bus on Saturdays and the net cost to the Town would be \$27,800. Councilor Brann noted that it is easy to understand why a Saturday service has not been implemented. However, Manager Lessard pointed out that while it is not feasible at the present time, we may want to look at a seasonal Saturday service in the future during the months of higher ridership. This will be added to the Infrastructure Committee's agenda for discussion.

b. TABOR II RESOLUTION

Mayor Arnett reported that the Finance Committee has discussed a proposed resolution in opposition to the Taxpayers Bill of Rights II (a/k/a TABOR II), which is Referendum Question 4 on the upcoming State ballot. The Committee recommends approval of the Resolution as proposed. He then read the Resolution for the record (copy attached).

Motion by Councilor Cox, seconded by Councilor Brann to adopt the Resolution as proposed – unanimous vote in favor.

c. LETTER TO THE EDITOR – EXCISE TAX – MAYOR ARNETT

Mayor Arnett had prepared a Letter to the Editor relative to the Council's opposition to Referendum Question 2, the proposed reduction in automobile excise tax (copy attached). He asked for the Council's support in sending the letter to the editor of *Bangor Daily News*.

Motion by Councilor Brann, seconded by Councilor Cox to authorize sending the Letter to the Editor – unanimous vote in favor.

d. LIQUOR LICENSE APPLICATION – WHITE HOUSE MOTEL, INC.
FILIBUSTER LOUNGE

Motion by Councilor Brann, seconded by Councilor Hughes to approve the application – unanimous vote in favor.

D. COMMITTEE REPORTS

Councilor Cox reported that the Services Committee will meet at 6:00 p.m. on October 13th.

Councilor Cushing reported that the Planning & Development Committee will not meet this week, but the next meeting will be at 6:00 p.m. on October 21st.

Councilor Brann reported that the Infrastructure Committee met on September 28th and heard a presentation on Stormwater. The next meeting will be on October 26th and agenda items will include composting and The Bus as well as the Council's semi-annual meeting with the Trustees of the Hampden Water District.

Mayor Arnett reported that he and Manager Lessard met with SAD #22 officials to get an update on where SAD #22 stands in terms of the reuse discussions. The Reuse Committee has spent a great deal of time on this issue, but the Board of Directors has not yet received a report. They do anticipate a report by the first of the year and it would not come to the Council before Spring.

RESOLUTION IN OPPOSITION TO THE INITIATED BILL LD 976
“An Act to Provide Tax Relief”, aka Taxpayers Bill of Rights II (TABOR II)

WHEREAS, since 2005, local governments in Maine have operated under a State law that limits the extent to which the property tax may increase in any given year and that requires the local governing body to vote on a separate article to exceed that limit; and

WHEREAS, this law also imposes expenditure limits on State Government; and

WHEREAS, since it was adopted, it has achieved its stated purpose, with current State spending and municipal property taxes both below targeted levels; and

WHEREAS, this citizen initiative, also known as TABOR II, will make changes to the current spending and property taxation limits that apply to all levels of government in Maine; and

WHEREAS, it will impose growth limits on all state spending, including the State's Highway Fund, where the current law places limits only on the State's General Fund; and

WHEREAS, TABOR II will require statewide voter approval for virtually all tax increases and expenditure increases above the growth limit, a requirement that entails significant additional state and local election expenditures and additional costs associated with its requirement that certain notices and financial information be mailed to every registered voter in the State at an estimated cost of \$800,000 for each mandated referendum; and

WHEREAS, at the municipal and county level, TABOR II also mandates referendum voting to approve any budget that exceeds the municipal or county property tax limit; and

WHEREAS, it also requires municipalities and counties to adopt a uniform budget format as developed by the State Planning Office that will add costs that must be borne by local government and its citizens; and

WHEREAS, TABOR II, if approved, will dramatically move state and local government in Maine in the direction of budgeting by referendum, the results of which have become apparent in those states where this has already happened; and

WHEREAS, it will limit the flexibility of both the State and its local governments to react to changing conditions, community needs, and economic conditions and undermine the authority of elected officials to make budgetary and service decisions based on information and a depth of analysis unlikely to be undertaken by the average voter.

NOW, THEREFORE BE IT RESOLVED BY THE TOWN COUNCIL OF HAMPDEN, MAINE that for the following reasons, the Hampden Town Council opposes the so-called TABOR II

question that will appear on the November 3, 2009 ballot and which would significantly modify current limits on State spending and on the municipal tax levy:

- The spending and levy limits established in current state law have been achieving their stated goal of reducing the tax burden on Maine citizens;
- The requirement that state spending above the spending limit and most tax increases be subject to a statewide referendum will increase both state and local expenses and move toward a system of budgeting by referendum which, as shown by experience elsewhere, is an ineffective way to make budgetary and service level decisions;
- By establishing the current year as the base from which future state spending increases are to be calculated, state spending, particularly for the Highway Fund, will be starting from a depressed level reflecting the impact of the current recession;
- Tax policy, budgets, and service levels are best decided through the core processes of representative government where the people elect individuals and charge them with the responsibility of making decisions based on data, analysis, debate, and public opinion while balancing the need for services and expenditures that address the common good with the ability of citizens to pay for such services.

Be it further resolved that we urge all citizens to become fully informed on this proposal prior to the November 3rd election by becoming familiar with the language of the proposal and reviewing materials provided by those supporting and opposing this measure.

Hampden Town Council Opposes Reduction in Excise Tax

The Hampden Town Council opposes Referendum 2 on the November ballot, the proposed reduction in auto excise tax. If adopted, 35% of the benefit would flow to a relatively few businesses and 65% would flow to less than one third of individual car owners—those owning a relatively new car. All Hampden property owners would subsidize the tax cuts for a few.

We believe the citizens of Hampden want high quality town and school services and most believe they are receiving good value for the taxes they pay. We also believe that Hampden residents prefer tax and spending management at the local level and oppose state level mandates such as Referendum initiatives 2 and 4.

The leading advocates for excise tax reduction believe that a town like Hampden could easily find and eliminate \$600,000 of waste from its budget; we respectfully disagree. First of all, support of public schools is by far the largest expense of the town and the town is not authorized to reduce its apportioned share of the school budget.

The net cost of town services in Hampden is roughly \$2,850,000 for the current fiscal year. To cut \$600,000 from this amount would require drastic cuts in personnel and services that we believe would outrage our citizens. The proposed referendum would require reductions as early as January and not later than March of the coming year. We do not believe our citizens would put up with such cuts; the only alternative would be to borrow money to cover shortfalls in the current fiscal year and raise real estate taxes next year to pay for the borrowing and for the excise tax cuts in coming years. The owner of a typical home in Hampden would pay roughly \$200 a year more to support auto excise tax cuts for others while receiving little or no tax cut himself.

If auto excise tax reduction is approved by the voters, we will, of course seek the best possible means of dealing with its consequences. We hope, however, that upon reflection, voters will agree that while perhaps well intended, reducing excise taxes in such an extreme and precipitous manner will do far more harm than good. We urge you to vote No on Referendum 2.

F. COUNCILOR'S COMMENTS


Councilor Shakespeare wished Councilor Cox a Happy Birthday.

Newsletter – The Fall edition of the newsletter is at the printers and should be out at the end of this week. Thanks to Editor Annie O'Reilly and Val Williams who does the layout for all of their efforts. The electronic version is now posted on the town website at <http://www.hampdenmaine.com>.

Tax Due Date – Tax Due date for the first half of property taxes is Wednesday, October 7th in order to avoid interest on the first half of taxes.

HA Building Committee Report – Attached to this report is a report from Kathy Walker and Norm Prouty in regard to the activities of the school building committee. Of particular concern in her report is the note that the bids for site work for the new high school were opened and that the low bidder was \$843,422 over the budget for the project.

LDI Average Personal Income Growth – The State Income growth factor for the 2010/2011 year is set at 1.78%. The Town is allowed to add to that percentage the % growth in local property assessment that is related to new construction for the prior year. After subtracting any increase in state revenue sharing received (it is a decrease in our case), this percent is the amount that the municipal budget to be used from taxation can increase without a special article adopted along with the council approved budget which authorizes the Town to exceed the LD1 limit. This budget year our LD1 Limit for the municipal taxation budget was \$3.1 million dollars. The municipal taxation budget for this year is \$2.86 million thanks to the efforts of the Council and the staff to keep the budget as low as possible.

Hazardous Waste Collection Day – On Saturday, October 3rd, 33 Hampden residents took advantage of the annual regional Hazardous Waste Collection Day that was held at the Bangor Recycling center. The Town has participated in this effort for many years. It affords residents a no-cost way to get rid of hazardous wastes in an environmentally friendly manner.

Hampden Highlights News Magazine – Economic & Community Development Specialist Dean Bennett has been working on taping several new shows for the Hampden Highlights New Magazine, one involves Public Works Director Chip Swan and the Mayo Road Project along with the potential impact of the Excise Tax referendum question, another that is currently airing is with Town Planner Robert Osborne, and there is another episode with the entire Economic Development Team.

Dog Park Meeting – A reminder that there is a meeting on ~~Monday~~ ^{Tuesday}, October ~~12th~~ ^{13th} at 7 p.m. at the Town Office for the purpose of discussing the idea of a Dog Park in Hampden. All interested persons are welcome to attend.

Landfill Closure Update – The second phase of the closure of the landfill will be complete by mid-October. The last waste delivery possible is 12/31/09, and at the present time it is estimated that landfill capacity may be reached slightly earlier than that date.

Gas to Energy Plant – Electricity Use – The Economic & Community Development Director and I met with landfill personnel and an energy consultant to discuss the possibility of using the electricity from the gas to energy plant for the benefit of Hampden residents. No community in Maine has yet sought designation as a Community Energy Supplier, but there is a possibility that it might work in our case. The energy consultant is supposed to provide us with a prospectus on how this might work. When we receive that we can agenda it for an Infrastructure Meeting at which it can be discussed more in depth.

The "groundbreaking" for the new Hampden Academy (HA) was held on a beautiful autumn afternoon (9-09-09) near the site of the new building. Members of the fall athletic teams in their purple and white uniforms outlined the footprint of the building behind the grandstand. Officials, present and past, from all three communities, and residents of all ages, attended the ceremony. The HA band and chorus performed, and several speakers made brief remarks. As a member of the Community Use subcommittee, Kathy was involved in some of the planning meetings for this event.

Bids for Phase I (Site Work) of the project were opened on October 1st. The regular September meeting of the Building Committee was postponed a day so members could be apprised of the bid results.

All three bids received (Lane Construction, R.F. Jordan, Sargent Corporation) were over budget. During the next two weeks, MSAD#22 and the low bidder, Sargent Corp, will be negotiating in an attempt to reduce the amount of their bid, which is \$843,422 over budget. The MSAD#22 Board of Directors is scheduled to meet on 10/14/09 and will vote to accept a lower negotiated bid or to bid the project a second time. This process will delay the beginning of the actual site work, and probably will delay the opening of the new HA by half a year.

Although construction bids have been coming in lower than expected for school projects around the state, WBRC engineers were not optimistic that site preparation bids would follow this trend. As the Town Councilors know, a lot of work must be done on this site.

Phase II of the project, the building, continues to be tweaked, with input from building committee members, school administrators and staff. Kathy has attended meetings of the subcommittee that is reviewing interior colors and materials with WBRC.

Copies of the most recent set of plans are available for perusal during business hours at WBRC and at the HA Principal's office. The next Building Committee meeting is scheduled on Wednesday, October 28th, 6:00 PM at HA.

Either one of us is willing to hear comments or answer questions, or to attend a Council meeting and provide a verbal update upon request. We appreciate the opportunity to be involved in this project.

RE: **Next Year's LD 1 Average Personal Income Growth is 1.78%**

With the passage of "LD 1" in 2005, towns and counties are required to calculate a property tax levy limit each year based on local property growth and statewide average personal income growth. Each town and county is responsible for calculating its property growth. The State Planning Office (SPO) is responsible for calculating income growth. For the 2009 property tax year (the 2010 budget year for most towns), SPO has determined that figure to be 1.78%. The table below shows how SPO calculated that percentage.

This calculation reflects the methodology described in LD 1, which is now Public Law 2005, Chapter 2: "Average real personal income growth" means the average for the prior 10 calendar years, ending with the most recent calendar year for which data is available, of the percent change in personal income in this State, as estimated by the United States Department of Commerce, Bureau of Economic Analysis, less the percent change in the Consumer Price Index for the calendar year."

2008 is currently the most recent year for which data is available. The Bureau of Economic Analysis (BEA) released a preliminary estimate of 2008 personal income in June 2009. BEA was scheduled to release a revised estimate for 2008 in September 2009. Unfortunately, BEA has delayed their September release. Therefore, SPO will consider the June 2009 preliminary estimate for 2008 as the most recent year which data is available and it will consider 1.78% the average real personal income growth described in LD 1.

NOVEMBER 30, 2009



Mayor Arnett noted that Manager Lessard was absent due to having surgery earlier today and wished her a speedy recovery.

A. CONSENT AGENDA

There were no Treasurer's Warrants for Finance Committee review. Motion by Councilor Cushing, seconded by Councilor Hughes to accept the balance of the Consent Agenda – unanimous vote in favor.

B. PUBLIC COMMENTS

There were none.

C. POLICY AGENDA

1. PUBLIC HEARINGS

Councilor Cushing introduced the proposed ordinance for public hearing on January 4, 2010.

Councilor Lawlis requested that the following items be added to the current list:

Councilor Cushing noted that the next step would be to prioritize the items and create a working plan for short-term and long-range objectives. He also thought it would be helpful to have cost estimates for some of the items on the list.

It was the consensus of the Council that this would require another work session and Mayor Arnett will work with Manager Lessard to set a date for the special meeting as soon as possible.

c. VFW BINGO & GAMES OF CHANCE LICENSE AUTHORIZATION

Motion by Councilor Brann, seconded by Councilor Cox to authorize the Whitcomb-Baker Post 4633 to operate bingo and games of chance – unanimous vote in favor.

4. NEW BUSINESS

- a. STREET LIGHT LOCATIONS:
- DUNTON CIRCLE/WESTERN AVENUE
 - DUNTON CIRCLE/SILVER DRIFT TRAIL

Councilor Brann noted that the recommendation from Public Safety is not necessarily for safety purposes – it is for convenience in identification of where the road access is. He feels that this could set a precedent and could lead to an increase in the number of street light requests all over town.

Councilor Hughes recommended and it was the consensus of the Council that this item be referred to the Infrastructure Committee for review and recommendation.

- b. GLACIAL ENERGY – INFRASTRUCTURE COMMITTEE
RECOMMENDATION TO AUTHORIZE TOWN MANAGER TO
SWITCH FROM STANDARD OFFER (See Infrastructure Committee
Minutes of 11/23/09)

Councilor Brann reported that the Infrastructure Committee reviewed information related to the alternative supply offer from Glacial Energy for the Town's small electric meters. He noted that there would be considerable cost savings and there is no cost to participate in the program nor is there a commitment to remain in the program for any length of time. It was the recommendation of the Infrastructure Committee that the Town Manager be authorized to transfer electric suppliers from the Standard Offer to Glacial Energy.

Motion by Councilor Brann, seconded by Councilor Lawlis to authorize the Town Manager to manage the Town's electrical power through Glacial Energy – unanimous vote in favor.

- c. VIVIAN GRESSER'S RETIREMENT RECEPTION

This item was informational only. Mayor Arnett informed everyone that a reception honoring long-time Tax Assessor Vivian Gresser will be held from 5:00 to 7:00 pm on Monday, January 4, 2010 in the Community Room. All are welcome to attend.

D. COMMITTEE REPORTS

Councilor Cox reported that the Services Committee has not met since the last Council meeting, but the Appointments sub-committee has interviewed most of the applicants for Friends of Dorothea Dix and will interview the remainder tomorrow evening. Once the interview process is complete, the Committee will bring recommendations to the Council. The next meeting of the Services Committee will be at 6:00 pm on Monday, December 14th.

Councilor Cushing reported that the Communications Committee met last week. Newsletter Editor Annie O'Reilly has a full slate of articles for the January edition of the

newsletter. There was discussion about the Cable TV station and a few new shows have been taped for broadcast this month. The Committee also discussed digitizing the cable recording and broadcast system and will be bringing a recommendation to the Council in the near future.

Councilor Cushing further reported that the Committee on Committees also met last week and has narrowed down its emphasis on the citizen-level committees. The Committee expects to have a report and recommendations for the Council within a couple of months. The next meeting is tentatively scheduled for December 23rd.

Councilor Brann reported that the Infrastructure Committee met on November 23rd and the minutes of that meeting were included in the Council packet. He noted that planning for the Mayo Road project is underway and Manager Lessard is working on a presentation for the replacement of the boiler in the Municipal Building. The next meeting will be at 6:00 pm on December 28th.

E. MANAGER'S REPORT

Due to Manager Lessard's absence, there was no Manager's Report.

F. COUNCILOR'S COMMENTS

Councilor Lawlis noted that the Dog Park Committee will be meeting at 7:00 pm on Thursday, December 10th in the Community Room.

Mayor Arnett thanked everyone who was involved in the Christmas Tree lighting this past weekend.

G. ADJOURNMENT

There being no further business, the meeting was adjourned at 7:36 p.m.







At the November 4, 2009 Council Planning and Development Committee meeting the vote was ~~unanimous~~ to return this item to the Council for public hearing.

As you know the committee reviewed this language and recommended that it be sent forward to the Council. Subsequently this language was reviewed by Town Attorney, Tom Russell who recommended the following changes which are incorporated into this draft of the ordinance.

Proposed Amendments to Outdoor Wood-Fired Boiler Annual Licensing Ordinance
As you know, the DEP adopted Chapter 150, entitled "Control of Emissions from Outdoor Wood Boilers", effective November 9, 2007. Chapter 150 has been amended twice since its adoption, the most recent amendments being effective April 7, 2009. Although Section 4(D) provides that Chapter 150 does not preempt any local ordinance, it is my understanding that the proposed amendments are intended to reconcile differences between Chapter 150 and the Town's Ordinance.

In my review of the proposed amendments to the Town's ordinance, I noticed that the amendments do not include amending the ordinance definition of "outdoor wood-fired boiler" to coincide with Chapter 150's definition of the term "outdoor wood boiler." Was there a reason for keeping the Town's existing definitions?

The terms "EPA Phase-One Qualified OWB" and "EPA Phase-Two Qualified OWB" are not contained in Chapter 150, and are apparently based on the particulate matter emission standards contained in Section 3(A)(1)-(2) of Chapter 150. I recommend that the definition of those two terms be modified to read as follows:

"EPA Phase-One Qualified OWB" means an OWB that has received certification pursuant to the EPA Outdoor Wood-Fired Hydronic Heater Program, or such alternative certification program as may be approved by the Maine Department of Environmental Protection, that the OWB meets a particulate matter emission limit of 0.60 lbs/MMBtu heat input."

"EPA Phase-Two Qualified OWB" means an OWB that has received certification pursuant to the EPA Outdoor Wood-Fired Hydronic Heater Program, or such alternative certification program as may be approved by the Maine Department of Environmental Protection, that the OWB meets a particulate matter emission limit of 0.32 lbs/MMBtu heat input."

Chapter 150 did not adopt a separate emission standard for outdoor pellet boilers, but it did adopt separate setback and stack height requirements for outdoor pellet boilers that have been certified to meet a particulate emission limit of 0.06 lbs/MMBtu heat output. The Town's proposed amendments include a definition of "Phase-Three Qualified OWB" that essentially creates a class of outdoor wood boilers (not just outdoor pellet boilers) that have less stringent setback and stack height requirements. Did the Ordinance Committee intend to apply those less stringent standards to all outdoor wood boilers that are certified to meet the 0.06 lbs/MMBtu limit? In any event, I recommend that the "Phase-Three" definition be modified to read as follows:

"Phase-Three Qualified OWB" means an OWB (or outdoor pellet boiler if the Town chooses to go with the DEP approach) that has received certification pursuant to the EPA Outdoor Wood-Fired Hydronic Heater

Program, or such alternative certification program as may be approved by the Maine Department of Environmental Protection, that the OWB meets a particulate matter emission limit of 0.06 lbs/MMBtu heat input."

I also recommend that the term "Non-EPA Qualified OWB" be modified to read as follows:

"Non-EPA Qualified OWB" means an OWB that has received certification pursuant to the EPA Outdoor Wood-Fired Hydronic Heater Program, or such alternative certification program as may be approved by the Maine Department of Environmental Protection, that the OWB meets a particulate matter emission limits greater than 0.60 lbs/MMBtu heat input or with no certification."

The Town should also include Chapter 150's definition of the term "outdoor pellet boiler" in Section 2.1 of its Ordinance.

Since the amendments to Section 4.4 will create "Neighboring residence setbacks", I recommend the inclusion of the following definition in Section 2.1:

"Neighboring Residence Setback" means the minimum linear distance that an outdoor wood-fired boiler (or outdoor wood boiler if the Town chooses to replace its definition of "outdoor wood-fired boiler" with the Chapter 150's definition of "outdoor wood boiler") must be sited away from the nearest dwelling that is not on the same property as the boiler."

ARTICLE 1
TITLE AND PURPOSE

1.1. Title. This chapter shall be known as the "Town of Hampden, Maine Outdoor Wood-Fired Boiler Annual Licensing Ordinance."

1.2. Home Rule Authority. It is adopted pursuant to Municipal Home Rule Law.

1.3. Purpose. Although outdoor wood-fired boilers may provide an economical alternative to conventional heating systems, concerns have been raised regarding the safety and environmental impacts of these heating devices, particularly the production of offensive odors and potential health effects of uncontrolled emissions. This Ordinance is intended to ensure that outdoor wood-fired boilers are utilized in a manner that does not create a nuisance and is not detrimental to the health, safety and general welfare of the residents of the Town. Furthermore, this ordinance is intended to comply with the minimum standards contained in DEP Chapter 150, Control of Emissions From Outdoor Wood Boilers.

ARTICLE 2
DEFINITIONS

2.1. Definitions. As used in this chapter, the following terms shall have the meanings indicated:

"Commercial outdoor wood boiler" means any outdoor wood boiler used to service a commercial establishment.

"Outdoor pellet boiler" means an outdoor wood boiler designed and warranted by the manufacturer specifically to burn pellet fuel with metered fuel and air feed and controlled combustion engineering, which is operated according to the manufacturer's specifications and burns only pellet fuel.

"Outdoor wood boiler" (also known as outdoor wood-fired hydronic heater, water stove or outdoor wood furnace) means a fuel burning device designed to (1) burn wood or other approved solid fuels; (2) that the manufacturer specifies for outdoor installation or installation in structures not normally occupied by humans (e.g., garages); and (3) heats building space and/or water via the distribution typically through pipes, of a fluid heated in the device, typically water or a water/antifreeze mixture.

~~"Outdoor wood fired boiler (OWB)" (same as outdoor wood fired furnace) means an accessory structure or appliance capable of being installed out of doors and designed to transfer or provide heat, via liquid or other means, through the burning of wood or any other non gaseous or non liquid fuels for heating spaces other than where such structure or appliance is located, any other structure or appliance on the premises, or for heating domestic, swimming pool, hot tub or Jacuzzi water. "Outdoor wood fired boiler or furnace" but does not include a fire pit, wood fired barbecue, or chiminea.~~

"Outdoor wood boiler Emission Rating" means the EPA's rating system for OWBs which rate the emissions in pounds per million BTU' or lbs/MMBtu.

"EPA Phase-One Qualified OWB" means an OWB that has received certification pursuant to the EPA Outdoor Wood-Fired Hydronic Heater Program, or such alternative certification program as may be approved by the Maine Department of Environmental Protection, that the OWB meets a particulate matter emission limit of 0.60 lbs/MMBtu heat input.

“EPA Phase-Two Qualified OWB” means an OWB that has received certification pursuant to the EPA Outdoor Wood-Fired Hydronic Heater Program, or such alternative certification program as may be approved by the Maine Department of Environmental Protection, that the OWB meets a particulate matter emission limit of 0.32 lbs/MMBtu heat input.

“Phase-Three Qualified OWB” means an OWB (or outdoor pellet boiler if the Town chooses to go with the DEP approach) that has received certification pursuant to the EPA Outdoor Wood-Fired Hydronic Heater Program, or such alternative certification program as may be approved by the Maine Department of Environmental Protection, that the OWB meets a particulate matter emission limit of 0.06 lbs/MMBtu heat input.

“Non-EPA Qualified OWB” means an OWB that has received certification pursuant to the EPA Outdoor Wood-Fired Hydronic Heater Program, or such alternative certification program as may be approved by the Maine Department of Environmental Protection, that the OWB meets a particulate matter emission limits greater than 0.60 lbs/MMBtu heat input or with no certification.

“DEP Qualified OWB” means that the manufacturer of the OWB has voluntarily submitted their product for emission rating to a government other than the US government or other testing bodies as deemed acceptable by the DEP and based on the OWB’s emission report the Maine Department of Environmental Protection classifies the OWB to the corresponding EPA standard. For purposes of this ordinance applicants must provide written documentation from the DEP to show evidence that the OWB is in fact DEP qualified.

“Neighboring Residence Setback” means the minimum linear distance that an outdoor wood boiler must be sited away from the nearest dwelling that is not on the same property as the boiler.

“Nuisance” means any odor, emission, or event that prevents the reasonable use and enjoyment of one’s property. For purposes of this ordinance, an OWB shall constitute a nuisance following three or more verified complaints within any 30 day period.

“Firewood” means trunks and branches of trees and bushes, but does not include leaves, needles, vines or brush smaller than three inches in diameter.

“Setback” means the minimum linear distance that an outdoor wood boiler must be sited away from a prescribed physical location on the ground.

“Untreated lumber” means dry wood which has been milled and dried but which has not been treated or combined with any petroleum product, chemical, preservative, glue, adhesive, stain, paint or other substance.

ARTICLE 3 ANNUAL LICENSE REQUIRED

3.1. Annual license required. In addition to any permit required under the Town’s Fire Prevention Code, no person shall cause, allow or maintain the use of an outdoor wood-fired boiler within the Town of Hampden, Maine without first having obtained an annual license from the Hampden Town Council. Application for annual license shall be made to the Town Clerk on the forms provided. (*Note: The state regulation does not require annual licensing*).

3.2. Standards for initial license. The Town Council shall issue an initial license for an outdoor wood-fired boiler if it determines that:

3.2.1 A permit has been issued for the proposed outdoor wood-fired boiler under the Fire Prevention Code; and

3.2.2 The proposed outdoor wood-fired boiler complies with the requirements of Sections 4.2, 4.3, 4.4 and 4.6 of this Ordinance.

3.2.3 The Town of Hampden shall not issue an initial license for a non-EPA qualified OWB or non-Maine Department of Environmental Protection alternative certified OWB after the effective date of this amendment.

3.3. Standards for renewal license. The Town Council shall issue a renewal license for an outdoor wood-fired boiler if it determines that:

3.3.1. The code official responsible for enforcement of the Fire Prevention Code provides written documentation to the effect that the outdoor wood-fired boiler is in compliance with the applicable provisions of that Code;

3.3.2 The outdoor wood-fired boiler is in compliance with the requirements of Sections 4.2, 4.3, 4.4, and 4.6 of this Ordinance;

3.3.3. The outdoor wood-fired boiler was operated in compliance with the requirements of Sections 4.1 and 4.5 of this Ordinance during the preceding year; and

3.3.4 None of the conditions set forth in Sections 5.1.1, 5.1.2, 5.1.3, 5.1.4, or 5.1.5 of this Ordinance occurred during the preceding year.

3.4. Existing outdoor wood-fired boilers. Any outdoor wood-fired boiler that was installed, connected, and operating as of the effective date of this Ordinance shall be permitted to remain, provided that the owner applies for and receives an annual license from the Town Council within 120 days of such effective date. Provided, however, that upon the effective date of this Ordinance all the provisions of this Ordinance, except Sections 4.2 *Permitted Zones*, 4.3 *Minimum Lot Size*, and 4.4 *Setbacks* in the event and to the extent that the existing outdoor wood-fired boiler in question does not comply with the same, shall immediately apply to any existing outdoor wood-fired boiler. Any existing outdoor wood-fired boiler that is not in compliance with Sections 4.3 and 4.4 shall not be made more nonconforming. If the owner of an existing outdoor wood-fired boiler does not receive a permit within one year of the effective date of this Ordinance, the outdoor wood-fired boiler shall be removed.

ARTICLE 4 SPECIFIC REQUIREMENTS

4.1. Permitted fuel. Only firewood and untreated lumber are permitted to be burned in any outdoor wood-fired boiler. Burning of any and all other materials in an outdoor wood-fired boiler is prohibited.

4.2. Permitted zones. Outdoor wood-fired boilers shall be permitted in all zoning districts except the Resource Protection District as shown on the Town's Zoning Map.

4.3. Minimum lot size Outdoor wood-fired boilers shall be permitted only on lots ~~of three acres or more~~ in accordance with the following minimum lot size:

	<u>Minimum Lot Size</u>
Existing Non-EPA Qualified Outdoor Wood Boilers Only	3 Acres
EPA Phase-One Qualified Outdoor Wood Boilers	1 Acre
EPA Phase-Two Qualified Outdoor Wood Boilers	0.5 Acre
Phase-Three Qualified Outdoor Wood Boilers (pellet)	0.25 Acre

The applicant for a permit under this Ordinance shall demonstrate that the Commercial outdoor wood boiler or Outdoor Wood Boiler with a thermal rating greater than 350,000 Btu/hr shall be installed and operated in accordance with Chapter 150 of the Rules of the Maine Department of Environmental Protection, "Control of Emissions from Outdoor Wood Boilers," as the same may be amended from time to time.

(Note: The state regulation does not set minimum lot sizes but it logically creates them with the required setbacks).

4.4. *Setbacks.* Outdoor wood-fired boilers shall be set back not less than 150 feet from the nearest lot line from property lines according to the following standards:

<u>Property Line Setback</u>	<u>Minimum</u>
Existing Non-EPA Qualified Outdoor Wood Boilers Only	150 Feet
EPA Phase-One Qualified Outdoor Wood Boilers	100 Feet
EPA Phase-Two Qualified Outdoor Wood Boilers	50 Feet
Phase-Three Qualified Outdoor Wood Boilers (pellet)	20 Feet

(Note: The state regulation requires these setbacks).

Additionally, outdoor wood-fired boilers shall be set back not less than 200 feet from neighboring residences according to the following standards:

<u>Neighboring Residence Setback</u>	<u>Minimum</u>
Existing Non-EPA Qualified Outdoor Wood Boilers Only	200 Feet
EPA Phase-One Qualified Outdoor Wood Boilers	120 Feet
EPA Phase-Two Qualified Outdoor Wood Boilers	70 Feet
Phase-Three Qualified Outdoor Wood Boilers (pellet)	40 Feet

(Note: The state regulation requires these setbacks).

Stack Height Requirements for New Outdoor Wood Boilers and Outdoor Pellet Boilers

Existing Non-EPA Qualified Outdoor Wood Boilers are not subject to this requirement.

EPA Phase-One Qualified Outdoor Wood Boilers. No person shall install or allow the installation of any EPA Phase-One Qualified Outdoor Wood Boiler unless the outdoor wood boiler or outdoor pellet boiler: (1) has an attached stack with a minimum stack height of 10 feet above ground level; or (2) has an attached stack extending two feet higher than the peak of the roof of the structure being served by the outdoor wood boiler or outdoor pellet boiler, if a neighboring residence is located less than 300 feet from the outdoor wood boiler or outdoor pellet boiler.

EPA Phase-One Qualified Outdoor Wood Boilers. No person shall operate any EPA Phase-One Qualified Outdoor Wood Boiler if a neighboring residence is located less than 300 feet from the outdoor wood boiler or outdoor pellet boiler, unless the outdoor wood boiler or outdoor pellet boiler has an

attached stack extending two feet higher than the peak of the roof of the structure being served by the outdoor wood boiler or outdoor pellet boiler.

EPA Phase-Two Qualified Outdoor Wood Boilers. No person shall install or allow the installation of any EPA Phase-Two Qualified Outdoor Wood Boiler unless the outdoor wood boiler or pellet boiler: (1) has an attached stack with a minimum stack height of 10 feet above ground level; or (2) has an attached stack extending two feet higher than the peak of the roof of the structure being served by the outdoor wood boiler or outdoor pellet boiler, if a neighboring residence is located less than 300 feet from the outdoor wood boiler or outdoor pellet boiler.

EPA Phase-Two Qualified Outdoor Wood Boilers. No person shall operate any EPA Phase-Two Qualified Outdoor Wood Boiler, if a neighboring residence is located less than 300 feet from the outdoor wood boiler or outdoor pellet boiler, unless the outdoor wood boiler or outdoor pellet boiler has an attached stack extending two feet higher than the peak of the roof of the structure being served by the outdoor wood boiler or outdoor pellet boiler.

Phase-Three Qualified Outdoor Wood Boilers. No person shall install or allow the installation of any Phase-Three Qualified Outdoor Wood Boilers, unless the outdoor pellet boiler: (1) has an attached stack with a minimum stack height of 10 feet above ground level; or (2) has an attached stack extending two feet higher than the peak of the roof of the structure being served by the outdoor pellet boiler, if a neighboring residence is located less than 100 feet from the outdoor pellet boiler.

Phase-Three Qualified Outdoor Wood Boilers. No person shall operate any Phase-Three Qualified Outdoor Wood Boilers, if a neighboring residence is located less than 100 feet from the outdoor pellet boiler, unless the outdoor pellet boiler has an attached stack extending two feet higher than the peak of the roof of the structure being served by the outdoor pellet boiler.

(Note: The state regulation requires these stack heights).

The applicant for a permit under this Ordinance shall demonstrate that the Commercial outdoor wood boiler or Outdoor Wood Boiler with a thermal rating greater than 350,000 Btu/hr shall be installed and operated in accordance with Chapter 150 of the Rules of the Maine Department of Environmental Protection, "Control of Emissions from Outdoor Wood Boilers," as the same may be amended from time to time.

4.5. Months of operation. Outdoor wood-fired boilers shall be prohibited from operation between the dates of May 1 and October 1.

(Note: The state regulation does not restrict months of operation).

4.6. Spark arrestors and rain caps. All outdoor wood-fired boilers shall be equipped with properly functioning spark arrestors. Use of a rain cap on the stack of an OWB is prohibited unless required by the manufacturer specifications.

(Note: The state regulation does not mandate spark arrestors but does prohibit rain caps).

4.7. Continued compliance required. If an outdoor wood-fired boiler is installed in compliance with Sections 4.3 and 4.4, the outdoor wood-fired boiler may not be used if the lot on which it is situated is altered so that the minimum lot size or setback(s) are no longer met.

ARTICLE 5 REVOCATION OF LICENSE

5.1. Revocation of license. A license issued pursuant to this Ordinance may, after notice and hearing, be revoked as the Town Council may determine to be necessary to protect the public health, safety and welfare of the residents of the Town of Hampden if any of the following conditions occur:

5.1.1. Emissions from the outdoor wood-fired boiler exhibit opacity that obscures or partially obscures clear view of structures and trees that lay behind the smoke and haze on either the property where the outdoor wood-fired boiler is located or on adjoining properties. This may be evidenced by photographs that are time dated;

5.1.2. Malodorous air contaminants from the outdoor wood-fired boiler are detectable outside the property boundaries of the land on which the outdoor wood-fired boiler is located. This may be evidenced by Town Public Safety Officials;

5.1.3. The emissions from the outdoor wood-fired boiler interfere with the reasonable enjoyment of life or property;

5.1.4. The emissions from the outdoor wood-fired boiler cause damage to vegetation or property; or

5.1.5. The emissions from the outdoor wood-fired boiler are or may be harmful to human or animal health.

5.2. Prohibited use after revocation. If a license is revoked, the outdoor wood-fired boiler in question shall not used or operated.

5.3. Reinstatement of license. A revoked license may be reinstated once the condition which resulted in revocation is remedied and reasonable assurances are given that such condition will not recur. Recurrence of a condition which has previously resulted in revocation of a license shall be considered a violation of this Ordinance subject to the penalties provided in *Section 7.1 Penalties for offenses* hereof.

ARTICLE 6 WAIVERS

6.1. Waivers. Where the Town Council finds that extraordinary and unnecessary hardships may result from strict compliance with this Ordinance, it may vary the regulations so that substantial justice may be done and the public interest secured, provided that such variations will not have the effect of nullifying the intent and purpose of this Ordinance or of jeopardizing the health, safety or welfare of the public. In varying any regulations, the Town Council may impose such conditions and requirements as it deems reasonable and prudent. The Town Council may, at its discretion, hold a public hearing as part of its review. If the Town Council grants the waiver, a license shall be issued for the outdoor wood-fired boiler. If the Town Council denies the waiver, the outdoor wood-fired boiler must either be brought into compliance with this Ordinance or removed. If the Town Council does not take any action with respect to the waiver within 60 days from its receipt of an application for waiver, the waiver shall be deemed denied.

ARTICLE 7 PENALTIES

7.1. Penalties for offenses. Failure to comply with any of the provisions of this Ordinance shall be a violation and, upon conviction thereof, shall be subject to a civil penalty in accordance with Title 30-A

M.R.S. §4452. In addition, any license issued pursuant to this Ordinance shall be revoked upon conviction of a second offense and the subject outdoor wood-fired boiler shall not be eligible for another license. Each day that a violation occurs shall constitute a separate offense. All penalties shall inure to the benefit of the Town of Hampden. The owners of premises upon which prohibited acts occur shall be jointly and severally liable for violations of this Ordinance. Violators shall also be responsible for any and all court fees, expert witness fees, costs, and reasonable attorney fees if the Town is the prevailing party in an enforcement action.

**ARTICLE 8
EFFECT ON OTHER REGULATIONS**

8.1. Effect on other regulations. Nothing contained herein shall authorize or allow burning which is prohibited by codes, laws, rules or regulations promulgated by the United States Environmental Protection Agency, Maine Department of Environmental Protection or any other federal, state, regional or local agency. Outdoor wood-fired boilers, and any electrical, plumbing or other apparatus or device used in connection with an outdoor wood-fired boilers, shall be installed, operated and maintained in conformity with the manufacturer's specifications and instructions and any and all local, state and federal codes, laws, rules and regulations. In case of a conflict between any provision of this Ordinance and any applicable federal, state or local ordinances, codes, laws, rules or regulations, the more restrictive or stringent provision or requirement shall prevail.

**ARTICLE 9
SEVERABILITY**

9.1. Severability. Should any provision of this Ordinance be declared unconstitutional or invalid by a court of competent jurisdiction, the remainder of this Ordinance shall not be affected.

**ARTICLE 10
EFFECTIVE DATE**

10.1. Effective Date. The effective date of this Ordinance shall be 30 days from the date of adoption by the Town Council.


